#### **BABY NEWS!!!**

Congratulations to Mrs Excell and her family on the arrival of her beautiful baby girl Valencia. We wish them all well from the Springwood School Community.



Warami Yiyura (Hello families), as part of Springwood Public school's Aboriginal Education program, each class will be participating in lessons over a 2 week period where they will be taught about Aboriginal History and Culture.

A basic outline of the program is as follows:

#### Early Stage 1 and Stage 1:

- Learn about the Dreamtime, Dreamtime stories and the meanings and messages that we can take from these
- Learn basic Darug words and phrases eg. body parts, greetings,
- Sing some songs in Darug eg. 'heads, shoulders, knees and toes'
- Learn about Country (what Australia looked like over 60,000 years ago compared to modern day through maps)
- Learn about respect for Mother Earth/Nature and practical ways we can care for nature
- Learn about our school's Totems (the red-crowned toadlet and Eastern longnecked turtle)
- Spend time communing with nature

#### Stage 2:


- As above plus:
- Learn names of Australian animals in Darug
- Learn songs in Darug with more complex language
- Take part in Aboriginal games and learn the stories behind these
- Compare past and present (direct link to History lesson)

#### Stage 3:

- As above plus:
- Learn Aboriginal symbols and how they tell stories
- Students will use symbols to design their own art works based on Dreamtime stories
- Students will share their stories in "Sharing Knowledge" circle times.

As a further involvement for parents/carers, each week one or two Darug words will be included in our newsletter so you can practice as a family!

### Movie Night Fundraiser for Bilbies! WHY BILBIES?

There is more to 'why save bilbies' than the fact that they look amazing, they have adorable ears and beautiful silky soft fur.

Firstly, bilby ancestors have been found as fossilised remains dating back 15 million years – which make them a very special species. They have been an intrinsic part of the landscape across 70% of the Australian mainland for all that time. From the time Europeans arrived, bilbies stretched from the Great Dividing range in the east to the Gascoyne coast in the west. Yet in the last 100 years they have been pushed to the brink of extinction as a direct result of colonisation, change of land use, population growth, and introduced non-native species.

The bilby is also an animal at the heart of Australia's First People's culture and is a significant creature present in many dreamtime stories and cave art. Secondly, bilbies are a scientific 'flagship' species. This means that their protection is even more important because their survival in turn increases the chances of 16 other threatened species and countless others who share the same habitats and threatening processes in the wild.

Bilbies are one of nature's eco-engineers, they play a really important part in the restoration of soil and rejuvenation of vegetation in arid Australia. They use their strong front paws to dig deep burrows which spiral down into the ground for roughly 2 metres.



Our Movie Night Fundraiser hopes to raise enough funds for a special camera used by the Bilby Foundation.

The cameras capture visual and audio footage – so they can be "Save the Bilby Fund's" 'eyes and ears'

to get to know bilbies. They are triggered by motion, which also saves battery life

The night vision is excellent – especially important for nocturnal bilbies

They have a battery life of a whole year – so "Save the Bilby Fund" can 'set and forget' them once they're in place.
